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May 2020 Monthly Report Summary

Services of the Sheriff's Office

The Campbell County Sheriff's Office has two main divisions. The uniformed division based in the Campbell County Justice Center and the administrative division based in the Campbell County Administration Building. The Sheriff's Office provides courthouse security at the Justice Center during business hours. Deputies and Court Security Officers (CSOs) are present for all court proceedings ranging from arraignments to trials, Family Court and more.

Deputies and Court Security Officers are also responsible for transporting prisoners to and from court as well as from area detention centers to the Campbell County Justice Center and Campbell County Detention Center.

In the administrative division of the Sheriff's Office, services such as the collection of property taxes; management of process of service of papers; processing of Carrying Concealed Deadly Weapons (CCDW) Permits; Finger printing; and Vehicle Inspections are performed.

Services of the Sheriff's Office

Please note that during the first part of the month of May Kentucky State and County offices were closed to walk-in business due to the Covid-19 pandemic, and at the end of the month select offices were just beginning to re-open. Sheriff's office employees were still reporting to the Courthouse and County Administration Buildings for work daily. However, the number of reported tasks performed by Sheriff's office employees will appear to be significantly reduced as a result of the postponement of many court activities, closure to in-person transactions in the office during the beginning of the month, and minimalization of prisoners being moved from facility to facility.

Deputies and Court Security Officers provide security for court hearings and trials as well as transport prisoners to and from court, from detention centers outside of Campbell County, to the Campbell County Detention Center, and to institutions such as the Eastern Kentucky Mental Health Hospital and the Kentucky Correctional Psychiatric Center (KCPC). During the month of May Deputies and CSO's made one trip within the state of Kentucky transporting a prisoner from KCPC to the Campbell County Detention Center. Six trips were made transporting prisoners from facilities outside of Kentucky to the Campbell County Justice Center and the Campbell County Detention Center. Deputies traveled 78 miles within the state of Kentucky and 558 miles outside of the state. Transports outside of Kentucky were made to Batavia, Dayton, Lebanon, and Lucasville Ohio.

Please note that additional trips may have been made during the month and not counted into monthly totals as there are several counties such as Kenton County in Kentucky and Hamilton County in Ohio that the Sheriff's Office transports prisoners from on a daily, or near daily, and as needed basis. Those trips are not always scheduled and therefore not always counted into monthly totals.

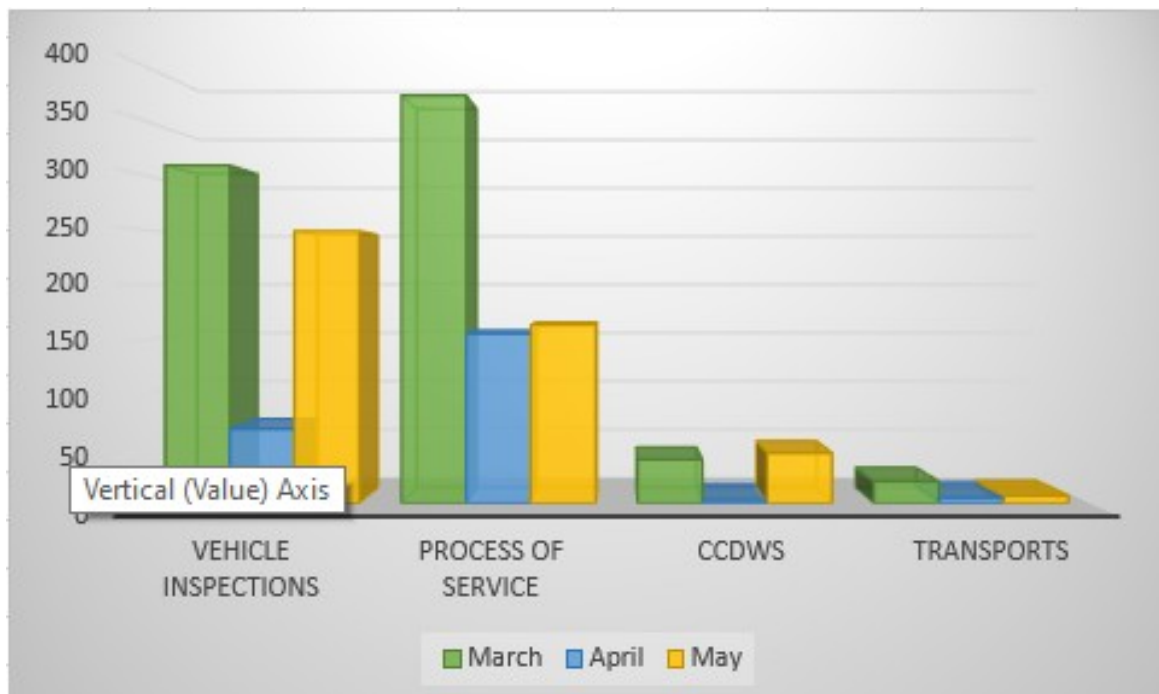
The Sheriff's Office also serves Warrants and issues Citations. During the month of May the Sheriff's Office served two warrants and wrote four citations.

Services performed in the administrative offices of the Sheriff's Office include collection of property taxes; processing and service of process papers, these papers include civil and criminal summonses, subpoenas, evictions and various other document types; Carrying Concealed Deadly Weapons (CCDW) Permits; Finger printing; and Vehicle Inspections. Throughout the month of May the Campbell County Sheriff's Office processed 163 papers; processed 46 CCDW applications, renewals, requests for duplicate licenses, or changes of information; and performed 249 vehicle inspections both at the Sheriff's Office location and off site.

Taxes

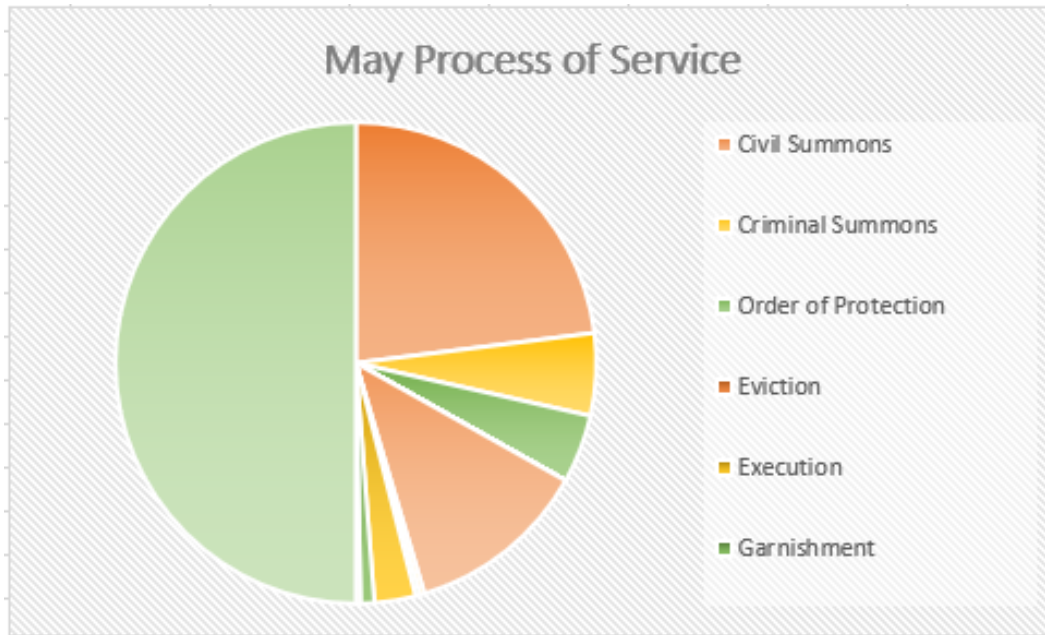
The 2019 County Property Tax collection began on November 1, 2019. During the first month of tax collection property owners may pay their tax bill with a 2% discount. During the month of December the base, or regular, amount of the tax bill may be paid. In the month of January the state imposes a late fee on property taxes for failure to pay by the regular deadline of December 31st. The period between February 1st and April 15th is usually the final period in which taxes may be paid at the Sheriff's Office. Due to the situation caused by the Covid-19 pandemic the state of Kentucky extended the period in which Sheriff's offices collect property taxes to May 15, 2020. After May 15th any tax bills not paid will be transferred to the County Clerk's Office for processing as delinquent bills. During the first two week period of May in which the Sheriff's Office was still collecting taxes, \$107,934.16 were collected in state and county property taxes.

Three Month Comparison of Services Performed by the Campbell County Sheriff's Office



Nearly all services listed here experienced a decrease in activity during the months of March, April, and May as the state of Kentucky attempted to address the Covid-19 pandemic. In March there were 309 vehicle inspection done, followed by 68 inspections in April. As the office began to re-open some services in May the number of vehicle inspections increased to 249. The number of documents processed decreased with 373 processed in March, 155 processed in April, and 163 processed in May. The number of CCDWs processed ranged from 40 CCDW permits in March, to 3 CCDW permits processed in April, and then back up with 46 processed in May. Deputies and Court Security Officers made 20 trips transporting prisoners in March, 5 trips in April, and 7 trips in May.

For a period at the end of the month the number of attempts made at serving papers was reduced while determining how to safely proceed with this service.
