November 2023 Monthly Report Summary

Services of the Sheriff's Office

The Campbell County Sheriff's Office has two main divisions. The uniformed division based in the Campbell County Justice Center and the administrative division based in the Campbell County Administration Building. The Sheriff's Office provides courthouse security at the Justice Center during business hours. Deputies and Court Security Officers (CSOs) are present for all court proceedings ranging from arraignments to trials, Family Court and more.

Deputies and Court Security Officers are also responsible for transporting prisoners to and from court as well as from area detention centers to the Campbell County Justice Center and Campbell County Detention Center.

In the administrative division of the Sheriff's Office, services such as the collection of property taxes; management of process of service of papers; processing of Carrying Concealed Deadly Weapons (CCDW) Permits; and Vehicle Inspections are performed.

Notable

On November 1st the Campbell County Sheriff's Office expanded its School Resource Officer program with the addition of Deputy Adam Noe. Deputy Noe retired as a Lieutenant from the Ft. Thomas Police Department after 22 years of service in Law Enforcement. Deputy Noe will be the School Resource Officer (SRO) for Newport Central Catholic and Bishop Brossart Schools.

Deputy Noe stated, "I'm excited to be part of the NCC and Bishop Brossart families. I hope to be able to provide a safe atmosphere for the students and faculty, but also provide peace of mind for the parents when their children are here! I know many of the families who have children at both schools, not to mention several of the faculty members." He continued, "Knowing these families, I have either coached their children at some point, known them since they were born or they are friends of us and our kids."

Sheriff Mike Jansen stated, "The Sheriff's Office feels that we really have struck gold with Deputy Noe and Deputy Darryl Jouett, who has been serving as SRO at Southgate Independent School since the start of the school year. Both men fit into their new roles extremely well, and the families and community can rest assured we will do all that is in our power to continue to keep children safe in this partnership with the schools."

In early November SRO Darryl Jouett hosted Mr. Chris Carpenter (Retired Lieutenant Fort Thomas PD) of Livingstone Security Systems at the Southgate Schools for a staff training session. Mr. Carpenter spent twenty years in law enforcement during which he spent 18 years assigned to the SWAT team where he served as a team leader. Mr. Carpenter has trained school staff, police patrol officers, SWAT operators, narcotics agents, Ark Encounter & Creation Museum public safety, private businesses, as well as agents / officers in an array of foreign countries. For this training session he spent several hours with the school's faculty and staff preparing them for what we hope and pray will never happen, an attack on the school. Having a readiness mindset and going through drills is paramount in protecting our children.



Training

In November Sheriff Mike Jansen, Chief Deputy Ken Fecher, and Deputies Tim Harney, George Schreiner, Craig Stephens, Ray Metz, and Daryll Jouett completed a 4 hour online training course entitle Emergency Vehicle Operations. This course is offered through the Kentucky Department of Criminal Justice Training (DOCJT) and is designed to meet the requirements of Kentucky House Bill 298 (Jill's Law). It addresses the mandatory requirements for Kentucky law enforcement agencies and officers regarding emergency and pursuit driving. The course covers agency policy, emergency and pursuit operations, legal aspects and case law, and the decision-making process for the individual officer involved in emergency vehicle operations.

Deputy Adam Noe completed a 2 hour online course through DOCJT entitle LEN MDT Re-cert. This is a re-certification course for the Law Enforcement Network Mobile Data Terminal (MDT). An MDT is a computer device commonly located in the console area of a police vehicle that allows the officer to access data and communicate with the dispatch center.

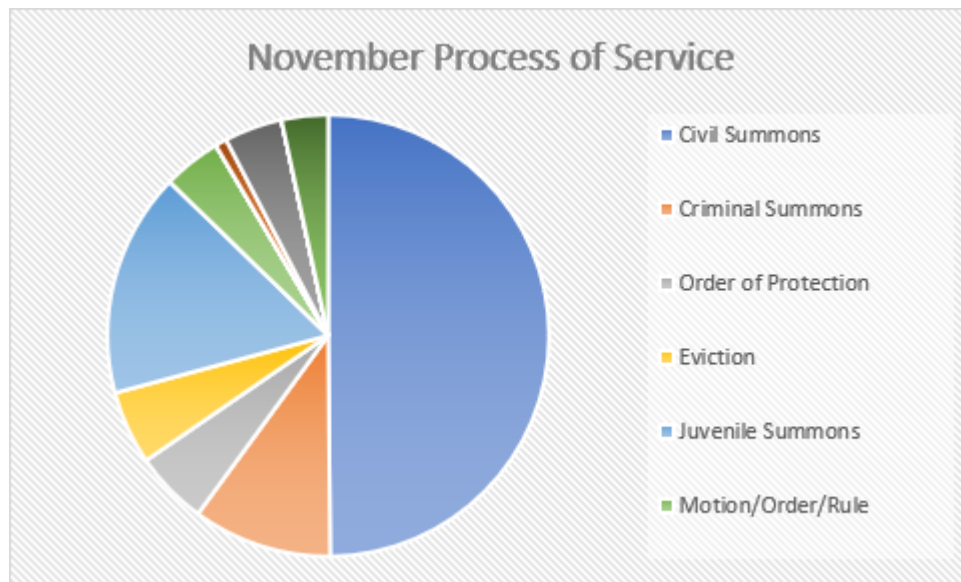
Services of the Sheriff's Office

Deputies and Court Security Officers (CSO's) provide security for court hearings, trials, and daily court operations. During the month of November there were two jury trials that deputies and CSOs worked security for. Deputies and CSO's also transport prisoners to and from court, from detention centers outside of Campbell County, to the Campbell County Detention Center, and to institutions such as the Eastern Kentucky Mental Health Hospital and the Kentucky Correctional Psychiatric Center (KCPC). This month Deputies and CSO's made 29 trips within the state of Kentucky traveling approximately 604 miles transporting 37 prisoners to the Campbell County Detention Center and/or Justice Center. These trips were made to Boone, Grant, Kenton, and Oldham Counties. Five trips were made transporting prisoners from facilities outside of Kentucky to the Campbell County Justice Center and the Campbell County Detention Center. For these trips Deputies traveled 783 miles to the cities of Batavia, Eaton, and Youngstown, Ohio and Greencastle, Indiana and Wartburg, Tennessee to transport prisoners back to Campbell County.

Deputies also serve warrants, issue citations, and complete Call Response Run Reports. During the month of November Deputies and Court Security Officers served out 8 warrants.

Services performed in the administrative offices of the Sheriff's Office include collection of property taxes during the time period of November 1st through April 15th of the following year. During the month of November property tax bills can be paid with a 2% discount. During this month the office collected and processed \$73,975,965.15 in taxes. The Sheriff's office also performs the processing and serving of Service of Process documents, these documents include civil and criminal summonses, subpoenas, evictions and various other document types; Carrying Concealed Deadly Weapons (CCDW) Permits; and Vehicle Inspections. Throughout the month of November the Campbell County Sheriff's Office processed 353 documents for Service of Process; 52 CCDW applications, renewals, requests for duplicate licenses, or changes of information; did 7 sets of fingerprints; and performed 665 vehicle inspections both at the Sheriff's Office location and off site.

Process of Service Documents Processed by the Campbell County Sheriff's Office

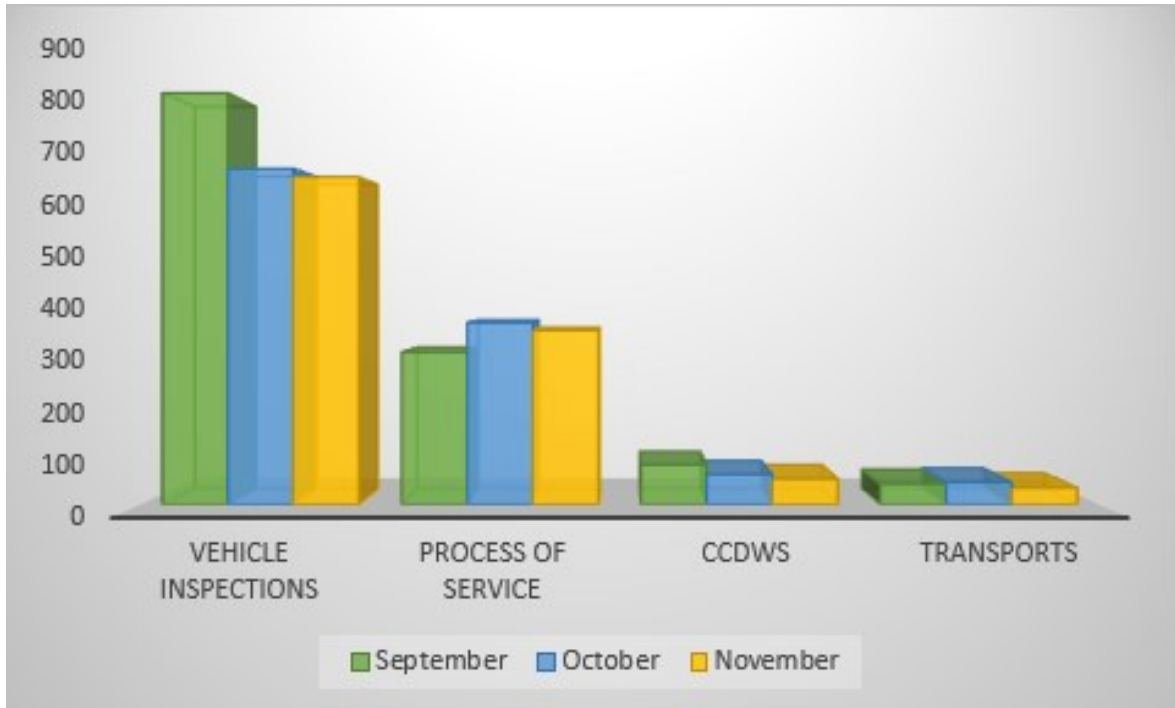
